# **Psychology**

This rather than traditional domination through a popular belief in the sacredness of existing tradition (perhaps like India?), or through charismatic domination, such as the power held by Donald Trump in the USA.

We had a general discussion about the procedures of voting, the effect of younger people being allowed the vote and whether the country should explore proportional representation again. We hoped that young would-be politicians were putting themselves forward for the right reasons, ie not just to gain Power, but with a wish to serve the country. So we shared an interesting conversation about politics without even raising our voices!

# **Board Games Group**



## **Classic Literature Group**

This month's book was 'Sybil, or the two nations,' by Benjamin Disraeli, published in 1846. Arguably a timely choice for this election month for those not yet tired of politics. Disraeli argues that England was divided into two nations in the 'hungry 1840s', the rich and the poor. To illustrate this, he describes the world of Westminster, gentlemen's clubs and stately homes, and contrasts it with the abject poverty of the working class, their appalling working conditions and dreadful tenement housing, the Chartist meetings, the sabotage of the mills by displaced handloom weavers, and the ensuing riots and their savage suppression by the army. The novel becomes a tale of derring-do with a mob ransacking a castle and the happy fulfilment of a budding romance across the great divide of class. This book helped establish one nation conservatism, and was somewhat surprisingly enjoyed by all who read it.

# **Novel Appreciation**

This month we discussed All my Puny Sorrows by Miriam Toews.

All the group enjoyed this clever and funny book, despite the difficult subject of suicide. The core of the story is Elf's longing to end her own life, and her sister's agonising dilemma about whether to agree to assist her.

It was helpful to have been given background to the early years of these two devoted sisters, intellectually somewhat set apart from their Canadian Mennonite community. Information gradually emerged about their childhood and parents, the mother proving a pivotal character.

We noted themes of sisterhood and life in the shadow of a very gifted older sibling; criticism of the medical model of psychiatric nursing; parenthood and family; the importance of literature and poetry in their lives. We appreciated the skilful use of humour that did not detract from touching and appropriately emotional aspects of the story. Overall, a vivid and authentic portrayal of a very current topic.
