Classic Literature Group

In July, we discussed 'Scarlet and Black' by Stendhal. It was published in 1830 and was written by Marie-Henri Beyle, using Stendhal as his pen name. The novel chronicles the attempts of a provincial young man to rise above his poor upbringing through a combination of talent, hard work, deception and hypocrisy. Members were surprised to learn that the novel was loosely based on police records of 1827, describing the similar story of a blacksmith.

The novel, set in post Napoleonic France prior to the 1830 July Revolution, was not initially well received. Its fame came later in the century. It is both a psychological portrait of the romantic hero, Julien Sorel and an analytic satire of early nineteenth century French society, especially the clergy and the aristocracy.

Our discussions centred on plot and characterization. Opinions were divided on whether Julien Sorel could be described as a hero. Most of us enjoyed this long novel.

Our August book is 'Mary Barton' by Elizabeth Gaskell.

On August 9th we were introduced to the technique of Illusion Knitting/Crochet which can produce remarkable results using just simple stitches and two colours of yarn. We were shown an example of what can be achieved in this case a knitted version of the cover from Queen's Bohemian Rapsody LP cover. After this we experimented with technique to make small knitted or crochet samples.



In response to requests from some members our session on August 23rd will cover crocheting for either right or left handed people. Yes, it is different. After a busy few months we are going to have a catch up session on September 6th.

Mike Astrop gave a typically fascinating presentation on Todmorden's riotous (and successful) resistance to the introduction of the inhuman new Poor Law regulations of 1834 (which introduced the infamous workhouses), and which resulted in Todmorden being the only area in the country to continue operating the former system of welfare for almost fifty years.

Jim Botten gave a brief overview of the history of the UK Census, in order to address some questions that were raised at the previous meeting, when we took a close look at Water Street as it was in 1851.

The next meeting will be on September the 2nd and will be a rather special one, with a guest speaker, Anne Mealia, talking about "Life and Death in Todmorden 1851-1901". The presentation will take place in the Stoodley Room at Tod College, lasting about an hour, and will cost £4 a head to attend, including refreshments. Novel Appreciation



The novel is set in an unnamed coastal town divided into an affluent tourist area and one of half-built, abandoned buildings and poverty-stricken immigrants. It revolves around two unnamed women who encounter each other by chance and recounts their tales in a very unconventional style.

We explored the possible meaning of the title in the context of the story, a number of options were posited.

We all found it very moving and, in many respects, harrowing. For some this made it very difficult to read, others found it very engaging despite the grim nature of the tale. Most thought the novel well worth reading and that its experimental form played a fundamental part in conveying the atmosphere and feelings.

Much hacking with the sticks to get a path through.

Finally, we emerged on Woodhouse Road to drop down to the Rochdale Canal via a steep flight of stone steps for a last easy mile back to Todmorden, apart from those who opted for a pub lunch at this point.
