

#### **Novel Appreciation**

This month we discussed *Piranesi* by Susanna Clarke. This fantasy novel won the Women's Prize for Fiction in 2021. Set in a parallel universe, Piranesi inhabits 'the House', which consists of hundreds of halls and vestibules containing large statues, with lower regions washed by tides of water. It apparently triggers memory and identity loss in newcomers. The story is told via Piranesi's journals as he lives alone, but regularly visited by a man he refers to as 'the Other'. His work of mapping and caring for the House is interrupted by the sudden appearance of an elderly man and woman who have links with the present day city of Manchester.

Most members of the group enjoyed the book, with several enjoying certain sections more than others. The themes of the novel and it's characters were interpreted by different people in different ways, which led to an interesting and detailed discussion. Piranesi was generally considered to be a very entertaining book of great imagination and originality.

Next month the talk is about Albert Einstein and it is entitled 'Everything is Relative'. ## **Strollers Group**

The group of three members met at 9:55 and caught the 10:08, 596 bus to Blackshaw Head. A scenic ride to the start of the walk at about 10:30. From the village we climb Higher Back Lane, a green lane which rises from Old Shaw Lane at the village start.

The track bears left and continues at an elevated level for about half a mile, to a cross-track. A right turn here and a vista where we could see much of the route ahead. Dry, fresh weather, good for walking and enabling clear distant views made this even more of a pleasure. This track is partly stony, partly grassed and narrow so care is needed.

Down hill for a few hundred yards to a farm at the head of Brown Hill Lane. A left turn takes the track behind low trees to a gate, and a rutted deep stony track for a quarter of a mile to a cross track at Field Head Farm - we cross the main track (New Road) and carry straight on towards Rodmer Clough. This downhill track passes Land Farm on our right.

We followed the metalled road over a pack-horse bridge (School Land Lane) which rises quite steeply for 1/4 mile up to Edge Lane where we turn right for a few hundred yards. At the brow of this road at a pair of galvanised gates on our left we climb through the adjacent gap style. Following a stony quarry track, bearing right at first bend to join a green track passing in front of a derelict building. The track joins a new rubble-capped track, turning right, looking for a gap-style onto Heptonstall moor on our left, briefly joining the Pennine Way. The track climbs over the moor and where it descends the Pennine Way cuts away to our left. We carry on until we reach a dry stone wall and a wooden gate. Through the gate to our right and follow the track to the upper edge of Popples Common. Turning right we pass two memorial benches, meet a limestone-chipped farm track, cross it and meet Smithwell Lane, and the bus stop for the 596 bus back to town. This bus runs every half hour and a bus came within 5 minutes.

3.4 miles - a little longer than anticipated but enjoyable, especially given the kind weather.

**NB** The Strollers Group is splitting into two to cater for those who wish to do a "stroll" of 1-2 miles on the flat (mainly!) and those who want the type of walk we have been doing this year i.e. around the 3 miles with some ups and downs. The World film group had two showings scheduled this month, although one never took place due to our inability to get timely access to the venue! The Other - an offbeat Western - went well, and was enjoyed by members

At the moment we are using our launch season to show films suggested by members, followed by a discussion of the films, and there will be further showings scheduled up to December 13th, with the next season starting in January 2025. There are usually two Friday showings in each month

There are capacity constraints on membership, but numbers are kept under active review, and we are happy to put people on a waiting list (which is currently empty, so admission is likely to be possible in the near future).
