


Figure 1: Art Appreciation: Turner Prize exhibition

## **Book Group**

At our February meeting, we discussed *Three Men in a Boat*, by Jerome K. Jerome. Written in 1889, it has been translated into many languages, adapted for TV, radio and film and never

been out of print. In 2003 The Guardian listed it among the 100 best works of fiction.

Written originally as a tourist guide, it follows the adventures and follies of three young men (not to mention their fox terrier, Montmorency, a character in his own right) on a boating holiday from the imagined stresses of their working lives. It combines descriptions of features of the upper reaches of the Thames with many humorous anecdotes. We enjoyed it enormously, considering it very much of its time but also in many ways timeless. The bumbling trio demonstrate their ineptitude in multitudinous different ways, whilst also managing to maintain a baseless confidence in their superior boating skills and, for example, knowledge of how to navigate Hampton Court Maze. We found it relatable and at times hilarious.

It was felt to be stylistically novel for its time, preceding as it did P.G.Wodehouse and others of a similar genre.

## **Bridge**

On Tuesday 17th February we will be holding our fourth session which is going to be a recap for the first three plus the members we be taking part in a mini bridge competition to see what they have learnt and remembered.

## Genealogy

We had a very interesting morning at Honest Johns last month when we all discussed an aspect of our own family research. These ranged from success in obtaining a father's war records; an ancestor who was committed to Bethlem Hospital (Bedlam) in London, two male relatives having paid £10 (over £1,000 in today's money) to have the woman who was suffering from post natal depression "put away"; the high instance of illegitimate births in a rural village; a family involved in stone quarrying and weaving in Sowerby Bridge; a project to list all the grave stones in Mount Zion church yard at Cornholme; an ancestor transported to Australia for bank note forgery; and a Jewish ancestor who had emigrated here from Amsterdam in 1853. The latter story was very appropriate as we met on what was Holocaust Memorial Day (27th January) and highlighted how the whole family had been lost in the concentration camps, with very few family members surviving. The tailor who had moved to London in 1853 was one of the lucky ones. Last month the part of the meeting at Honest Johns over ran time wise so it became apparent that we need to meet twice a month, at Todmorden library on the 4th Tuesday morning – 10 – 12 noon for research help/advice – This is very much a drop in session when we can offer help and advice on getting started or dealing with dead ends etc.

The second meeting will be on the 2nd Tuesday of the month at Honest John's 10.30 – 12 noon for discussion and swapping of information/stories etc.

Our next two meetings will therefore be Tuesday 24th Febru-

ary at Todmorden Library for research etc. 10 – 12 noon and Tuesday 10th March 10.30 – 12 noon at Honest Johns when we will be looking at Marriage and Divorce.
