They are displayed alongside key artworks tracing how landscape printing and also the use of the new pigment Prussian Blue revolutionised Japanese art. It was amazing to see Hokusai's iconic Under the Wave off Kanagawa

The Book Group

Our August book, 'James' by Percival Everett, is both a tribute to, and a deep critique of, Mark Twain's 'Huckleberry Finn'. The story of Huck and Jim is retold by James, the slave who renames himself - just as Samuel Clemens renamed himself Mark Twain. Laced with dark humour, James's account is of a secretly literate man who reveals that the seemingly passive vernacular among black slaves of the early 19th century is a front to conceal their true thoughts, feelings and intelligence. He writes a tale in which the central issue is not - as in Twain - whether Huck Finn turns Jim in as a slave on the run, but how James cannot merely escape but create freedom for himself through the gift of words and writing.

The novel is an unflinching account of the violence and constant fear of slaves' lives, yet stylish in creating a picaresque page-turner as Huck and James head down the Mississippi. Some found the style a little 'tricksy', lessening empathy for the central character by its very cleverness; many found the book profound and absorbing.

Everett uses many fine elements of Twain's plot but also introduces decisive changes, for example moving the action forwards by 20 years to the Civil War so that the possibility of emancipation is imminent. The denouement reveals that Huck - unlike Twain's version - is the biological son of James, but can pass as white. Everett is a prolific novelist but is peaking at an age that makes him eligible for his local u3a!

Walking Cricket

The Tigers have had two competitive matches recently a Wakefield on the 29th July against a visiting team from Epsom and at Oldham on the 12th August. Both games were close run events with the Tigers scoring their biggest ever total of runs - 231, against Epsom. But they still lost by 61 runs.
